Crime and Community Safety

Two arrested for break-in to garage in Horsham

Following the report of a break-in to a garage in Cricketfield Road, Horsham just after midnight on Monday 13 April where a motocross bike and mountain bike were stolen, officers have arrested two men in connection with the offence. They are currently on conditional bail whilst further investigations are carried out.

Local man convicted of committing Horsham burglary

Joshua Caswell, 24, of no fixed address, pleaded guilty at Lewes Crown Court on 20 April of committing a burglary at a property in Littlehaven Lane, Horsham in March 2015. Caswell was sentenced to 29 months imprisonment and ordered to pay a victim surcharge of £120.

Continuing success of Junior Neighbourhood Watch Scheme in Horsham District

PCSOs Damian Cecil and Sue Poynter visited Southwater Junior academy earlier this month to talk to pupils about the Junior Neighbourhood Watch (JNHW) scheme. They are pleased to report that due to the popularity of the scheme amongst the pupils, the school will be launching the six week course this half term.

The programme devised by Derek Pratt, Deputy Chair of Sussex Neighbourhood Watch Federation, consists of six, one hour sessions for Year 6 (11 year old) pupils, delivered after school. Attendance is voluntary, with parental approval. Derek's programme gives full and very effective guidance for the JNHW volunteers and for the pupil. JNHW helps to educate the pupils to assist in preventing children becoming victims of crime or future causes of crime. It develops skills to ensure the pupils can keep themselves safe, as well as their homes and streets; it helps build the children's self-esteem and assists in breaking down fear barriers with the police to promote dealing with police openly and with respect.
